The range of total score obtained was 245-400/450. Five Departments obtained Grade A, ten obtained Grade B, one with Grade C. The highest score of 400 was obtained by the Department of Fine Arts and minimum that of 245 by Department of Political Science.

Suggestions/Feedback

- L. All stakeholders must strengthen internship opportunities and experiential learning components.
 - 2. More sources for Grants for organising Expert Lectures / Workshops / Seminars could be obtained in order to provide an enriching academic experience to learners.
 - 3. Departments must re-orient themselves in anticipation of the complete introduction of the NEP, to include interdisciplinary courses, value-added programs, and skill-based training modules.
 - 4. In the area of research practices, participation in research, publication in peer-reviewed journals, and conference presentations needs to be encouraged.
 - 5. More faculty members should be encouraged to act as resource persons in research activities. The Departments should work towards offering more Consultancy services. Engage alumni actively in institutional activities and development.
